Staff Exchange Programme

In the spirit of cross-disciplinarity, Bridging the Gaps is offering funding that will allow academics to experience life in another department.

The Bridging the Gaps Staff Exchange Programme

is a funding opportunity that will develop cross-disciplinary research partnerships 4 awards us know how you intend to work together by taking researchers out of their usual environments. The programme provides the opportunity for an early career researcher (up to and including reader) to work in another department, or for two researchers to work together in UCL's Chorley Institute.

There are 4 awards of up to £3,000 each available. To apply you must be an early career academic at UCL, and the staff exchange must be in order for you to work on an activity that supports or develops research into sustainable urban spaces.

The programme works by reimbursing your home department for the cost of covering your teaching

and other duties while you are taking part in the exchange.

To apply you should identify an area of sustainable urban spaces research that requires a cross-

> disciplinary approach, then you should let on an activity that develops this area.

> You need to have the permission of two heads of department. These will be either the head of department that is releasing

the member of staff and the head of the hosting department. Or, if both staff wish to work away from their home departments in the Chorley Institute, the heads of both departments that are releasing staff.

After the exchange you will be expected to write a report on your work, and prepare a presentation for a forthcoming Bridging the Gaps event.

There is no deadline for this call, which will run until all the awards have been made.

Funding

Seminar Bridging the Gaps Seminar Funding offers support for a seminar or a series of seminars.

If you need financial assistance to arrange one or more seminars that address sustainable urban spaces from an interdisciplinary viewpoint, apply for Bridging the Gaps Seminar Funding.

The Open Programme

At the time of writing the Bridging the Gaps Open Programme still has just over £2,500 available for 2008.

Funding So Far

So far the Bridging the Gaps Programme at UCL has funded around £27,500 of cross disciplinary activities, involving eleven different departments, centres and institutes across UCL.

Open Programme

The Open Programme provides up to £1,000 for activities that lead to, or support, interdisciplinary research collaboration. Since the start of the programme we have funded

- Novel approaches to street-scale pollution dispersion modelling
- Sustainable urban spaces for people with disabilities
- A collaborative session at UCL's inaugural National Environmental crime conference
- Natural ventilation for greener and healthier buildings

MSc Competition

The winning entries to the MSc competition, which awarded £6,000 to each pair of supervisors were:

- Contribution of rooftop rainwater harvesting to the water supply-demand balance in London - a case study
- A New Hydride Fuel Cell Hybrid for Zero **Emissions Vehicles**
- performance Uncertainty in building simulations
