UCL English for Academic Purposes Courses Key facts

Course aims:

- Fulfil UCL's English language requirements for degree programme entry (See the table opposite for a brief guide to the requirements)
- Satisfy the English language requirements for some courses at other UK universities
- Prepare students for academic study at UK universities.

Course objectives:

- Develop the study skills needed to succeed at a top UK university, including:
 - reading academic texts quickly and productively
 - expressing ideas clearly and accurately in academic writing
 - undertaking independent research
 - developing students' critical thinking skills
 - giving oral presentations and participating in seminars
 - effective note taking.


Course features:

DIPLOMA IN ENGLISH FOR ACADEMIC PURPOSES



Course aims

This is a preparatory course for international students who want to follow graduate or undergraduate programmes at UCL or at other UK universities. Some students may also wish to improve their English for professional purposes.

Typically students on the Diploma will have a starting level of between 5.0 – 6.5 IELTS (or equivalent).

By the end of the course, students will have developed the academic and linguistic skills required to succeed on a UK degree programme and be familiar with the academic culture and conventions of the UK Higher Education system.



Course structure

The 32-week Diploma course consists of classes, lectures, seminars and tutorials.

Term 1 Focuses on academic English, integrating the four skill areas of writing, reading, listening and speaking, including building grammar, vocabulary, seminar and note-taking skills. Weekly lectures by leading UCL academics include a variety of disciplines from Architecture to Zoology. Students' progress is closely monitored through homework tasks and in-class tests.

Term 2 Focuses on the development of independent research skills, academic writing skills for research essays and presentation skills. These are subject-related and allow students to focus on their academic discipline (e.g. Engineering, Law, etc.). Core skills introduced in Term 1 continue to be built upon.

Research work is closely guided and supported by weekly individual tutorials. Weekly lectures will provide an excellent opportunity to expand subject terminology and knowledge.

Term 3 Classes and seminars continue to build on core skill areas. Students will focus on an independent academic research essay.



Course assessment

Students will receive the Diploma qualification based on the formal course assessments and examinations completed in Term 3.

The Diploma finishes on 30th June 2014. Diploma programme dates include examination results and additional course administration, where necessary. Diploma tuition and course examinations end no later than the 13th June 2014.




The qualification

Example activities included during a typical week:

- Finding and referring to sources – research skills
- Selecting and referring to key points from a research article – reading skills
- Developing an argument and incorporating sources to support it – writing skills
- Looking at reporting verbs and the passive to refer to sources – grammar and vocabulary skills
- Presenting and supporting opinions in seminars – speaking skills
- Giving effective presentations – speaking skills

PRE-SESSIONAL ENGLISH COURSES

Course aims

These intensive English for Academic Purposes courses are designed for international students who plan to enrol on a graduate degree programme (MA, MSc, LLM, MPhil/PhD) at UCL or at another UK university. A smaller number of students join the Pre-session course holding an offer of a place on an undergraduate programme.

Selecting the correct Pre-session Course

Students will usually need to raise their level of English significantly in a short period of time due to the requirements of a conditional offer of a place on a Master's or PhD programme.

Pre-session Course applicants should consider:

- The minimum entry requirement for the particular Pre-session Course
- The time needed to reach the language level required for their future degree programme
- Their current level of English.

It is **estimated** that strong students should be able to improve their English language level – in each sub-skill – by the equivalent of **approximately** 0.5 IELTS every four weeks of the course (together with a minimum of 10 hours additional self-study per week).

Examples of minimum length of study required:

- A student with an **IELTS of 6.0** who needs a final score of **IELTS 7.5** for entry onto their following degree programme may be considered for the **11-week Course**, although the **Extended Course** would be recommended.
- A student with an **IELTS of 6.5** who needs a final score of **IELTS 7.0** for entry onto their following degree programme may be considered for the **5-week Course**, although the **8-week Course** would be recommended.

Course structure

Students will follow a mixture of classes, lectures and tutorials each week. Subject option classes provide the opportunity to work with other students who share similar academic interests. The timetable also includes a lecture programme given by leading UCL academics.

- Attending a live academic lecture and noting key points – listening skills
- Studying in the Self-Access and Resources Centre
- Taking part in the UCL student union sports clubs and societies
- Meeting the Centre's educational advisor
- Having a one-to-one tutorial with your personal tutor
- Visiting the Houses of Parliament – social programme






Applying for a place on a UCL English for Academic Purposes course

Please apply as early as possible to secure your place on the course and in UCL accommodation.

1. Select the appropriate course for your English language level, academic aims and availability from the information provided in this brochure and on our website.
2. Applications forms can be found online at www.ucl.ac.uk/eap. These should be completed and returned with the relevant documents.
3. When your application has been assessed we will contact you to confirm whether we can offer you a place on the course and will send you an offer pack. Entry will depend on an applicant's existing level of English (including subtests), academic history and final score needed.
4. Our offer pack includes information about how you can formally accept your offer and pay the course fees, as well as how to apply for UCL accommodation if you are eligible.
