# UCL English for Academic Purposes Courses (UCL EAP)

## Key facts

### Course aims

- Fulfil UCL's English language requirements for degree programme entry (See the table opposite for a brief guide to the requirements)
- Satisfy the English language requirements for some courses at other UK universities
- Prepare students for academic study at UK universities.

### Course objectives

Develop the study skills needed to succeed at a top UK university, including:

- reading academic texts quickly and productively
- expressing ideas clearly and accurately in academic writing
- undertaking independent research
- developing critical thinking skills
- giving oral presentations and participating in seminars
- effective note-taking.

### Course features

- Taught at UCL by UCL teaching staff
- Opportunities to attend lectures given by leading UCL academics
- Students are UCL students with access to UCL facilities and student accommodation options
- Taught in classes, seminars and lectures
- EAP classes are taught in small groups with a maximum of 14 learners per class
- A minimum of 20 UCL teaching hours\* per week
- Weekly individual tutorials (one-to-one sessions with a Personal Tutor)
- Individual support and guidance on submitting degree applications
- Optional IELTS preparation classes
- A social programme of events in London for all students.

\* The "teaching hour" at UCL is 50 minutes

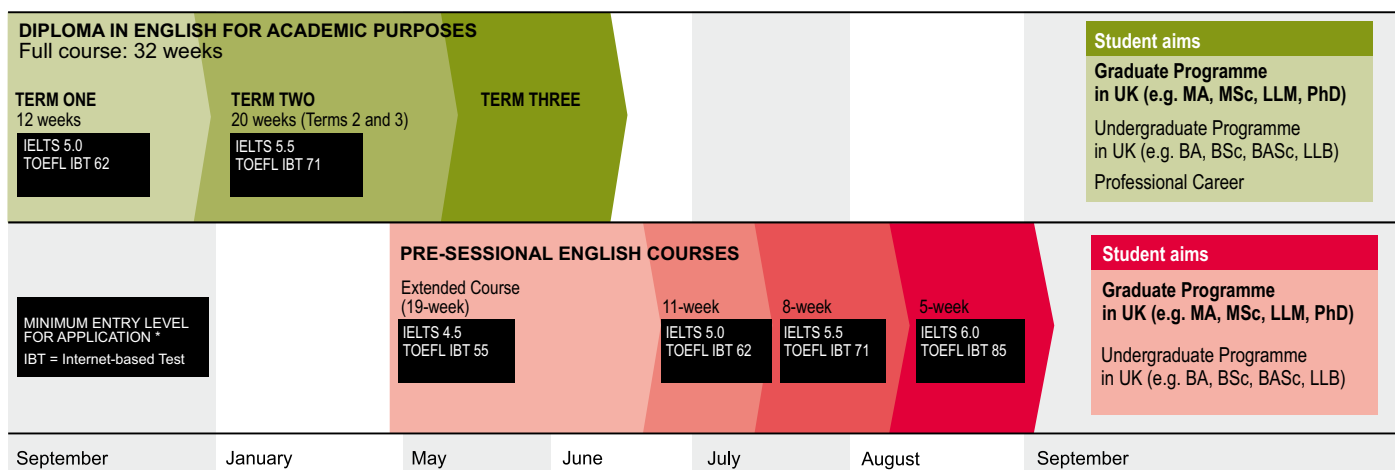

# Diploma in English for Academic Purposes

## Course aims

This is a preparatory course for international students who want to follow graduate or undergraduate programmes at UCL or at other UK universities. Some students may also wish to improve their English for professional purposes.

Typically students on the Diploma will have a starting level of between 5.0 – 6.5 IELTS (or equivalent).

By the end of the course, students will have developed the academic and linguistic skills required to succeed on a UK degree programme and be familiar with the academic culture and conventions of the UK Higher Education system.

## Course structure

The 32-week Diploma course consists of classes, lectures, seminars and tutorials.

**Term 1** Focuses on Academic English, integrating the four skill areas of writing, reading, listening and speaking, including building grammar, vocabulary, seminar and note-taking skills. Weekly lectures by leading UCL academics include a variety of disciplines from Architecture to Zoology. Students' progress is closely monitored through homework tasks and in-class tests.

**Term 2** Focuses on the development of independent research skills, academic writing skills for research essays and presentation skills. These are subject-related and allow students to focus on their academic discipline (e.g. Engineering, Law, etc). Core skills introduced in Term 1 continue to be built upon.

Research work is closely guided and supported by weekly individual tutorials. Weekly lectures will provide an excellent opportunity to expand subject terminology and knowledge.

**Term 3** Classes and seminars continue to build on core skill areas. Students focus on an independent academic research essay.

## Course assessment

Students receive the Diploma qualification based on the formal course assessments and examinations completed in Term 3.

### Coursework

Worth 40% of the final score:

- research essay
- oral presentation
- seminar participation

### Final examinations

Worth 60% of the final score:

- writing skills examination
- listening and note-taking examination
- reading skills examination

## The qualification

The UCL Diploma in English for Academic Purposes is recognised as satisfying UCL's English language proficiency requirement, and is also accepted by a number of other leading institutions in London and the UK.

## Destinations

In 2013 73% of Diploma students applying for degree programmes in the UK received a UCL, Russell Group or University of London offer.

In addition to UCL, former Diploma students have progressed to a number of leading UK universities including: Oxford, Imperial College London, London School of Economics, Warwick, Queen Mary, Durham, Bristol, Manchester, Exeter and Bath.

# Pre-Sessional English Courses

## Course aims

These intensive courses are designed for international students who plan to enrol on a graduate degree programme (MA, MSc, LLM, MPhil/PhD) at UCL or at another UK university. A small number of Pre-sessional students will be holding an undergraduate degree offer.

Students will usually need to raise their level of English significantly in a short period of time due to the requirements of a conditional offer of a place on a Master's or PhD programme.

Pre-sessional Course applicants should consider:

- The minimum entry requirement for the particular Pre-sessional Course
- The time needed to reach the language level required for their future degree programme
- Their current level of English (including subtests).

## Course structure

Students follow a mixture of classes, lectures and tutorials each week, while focusing on their own academic subject areas during library research, extended essay assignments and oral presentation preparation. The timetable also includes a lecture programme given by leading UCL academics.

A 90-minute optional IELTS preparation class is included on the 19 (Extended), 11 and 8-week courses for students who need IELTS in order to fulfil their English language requirement at other universities. IELTS preparation is not available on the 5-week course.

## Course assessment

All examinations take place in the final week of the Pre-sessional Courses.

### Coursework

Worth 40% of the final score:

- research essay
- oral presentation

### Final examinations

Worth 60% of the final score:

- writing skills examination
- listening and note-taking examination
- reading skills examination

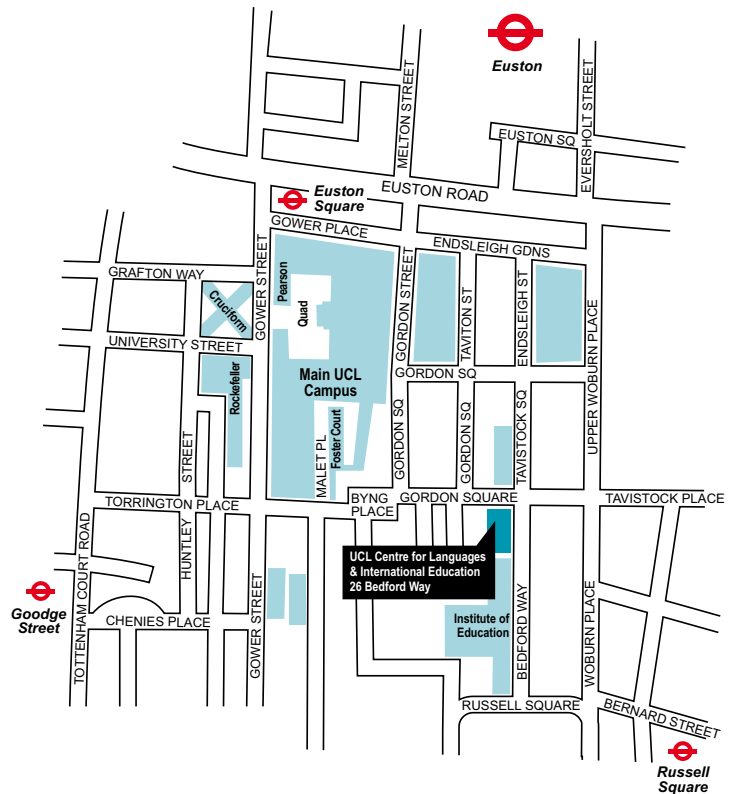
