II The Year's Work

First stage analysis and checking of thirteen texts has been completed by Oonagh Sayce and Sylvia Chalker. This brings the total number of texts analysed and filed so far to 122 (59 written and 63 spoken). Grace Stewart has continued to work on the intonation files.

The new version of the Workbook, revised by Sylvia Chalker and Robert Ilson, is now complete and available for consultation by visitors. Sylvia Chalker's grammar for teachers of EFL, Current English Grammar, is due to appear in 1984, published by Macmillan.

Bernard Lott has completed his second-stage analysis of prepositional phrases and is currently writing up the results of his research. He continues to tutor for the Open University. René Quinault helped to organize the Seventeenth International Conference of IATEFL this Spring.

Robert Ilson gave talks at the University of London Institute of Education on the Survey and on the Longman Dictionary of Contemporary English, and addressed a research seminar at the University of Birmingham on the language of lexicographers. In April he spoke at an Anglo-Soviet language teaching conference in London on English dictionaries for foreign learners. He is currently editing a volume of ELT documents on lexicography for the British Council and is collaborating with Morton and Evelyn Benson on The Dictionary Description of English.

R. A. Close was active in advising the Longman Group on specialized linguistic publications, and contributed a number of reviews to British Book News and Studia Linguistica. In November he read a paper on 'Ethnic characteristics in communication in English' at the English-Speaking Union seminar on English as an international language.

The Longman Fellow in English Language this year was Dr. M. A. Yadugiri of Bangalore University. During the year she undertook an extensive analysis of yes-no questions in Survey texts, and completed three preliminary working papers on this topic. She also made valuable contributions to the teaching of the English Department.
