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Interview with Daniel Marfany, *the Acting Disability Co-ordinator*

Q: What do you mean by “disability”?

Disability is defined by the Equality Act 2010 as a substantial physical or mental condition that has lasted for 6 months and is expected to last for a further 6 months or more. Disability under this definition includes impairments such as: blindness, hearing impairment and mobility problems as well as mental health issues, autistic spectrum disorders, specific learning difficulties (i.e. Dyslexia, Dyspraxia, etc.) and long-term medical conditions such as Chronic Fatigue Syndrome. The point I would like to make here, is that often students who do not consider themselves disabled may have a condition which entitles them to additional support provided by the UCL [Student Disability Services](#).

Q: What type of support is available at UCL for students who fall within this category?

We take a person centered approach and arrange support on a student by student basis. I would encourage students who feel they may be entitled to support from us to contact our team and discuss the different options available to them.

Q: How many UCL students are registered with your Service and receive additional support?

This academic year we have been supporting 1375 students in total, of them 252 are international. It is likely that there is a large number of students who have an undisclosed disability and as such this figure may not represent the total disabled population of UCL.

Q: Is there any financial support available at UCL for international students with disabilities?

Yes, we commit to covering the additional costs students may incur as a result of a disability. For instance, we wouldn't pay a student's fees or maintenance but we can support them to study effectively by meeting their costs for specialist software and/or a note taker.

The [UCL International Disabled Students Fund](#) which we run aims to match the Disabled students' allowances which are available to UK students through Student Finance England. This is to ensure that international students with disabilities are not at a disadvantage when studying at UCL.

Q: What is your advice to students who may feel that there is some stigma associated with approaching Student Disability Services for help?

If a student feels anxious about contacting Student Disability Services, I would advise them to contact Alison Angel anonymously on 020 7679 0100. Alison will be able to give them an initial advice and if they decide to seek further help, she can put them in touch with the member of our team who is best positioned to help them.

Q: Is the service you provide confidential?

Yes, everything that students discuss with Student Disability Services staff is confidential. In some instances, where other people need to be informed in order for the appropriate support to be put in place, we would always ensure the student has given us their consent to do this.

Q: What support is available to students with disabilities at exams?



- While jobs at the Olympic Park are no longer an option (as all employees needed to be UK Boarder Agency approved by April), extra help within pubs, cafes, restaurants and retail will be needed to handle the

- Often smaller business advertise their roles by posting notices in their window so keep your eyes peeled as you're walking around your local neighbourhood. Getting a local part-time job keeps your travel costs down, and also gets you really involved in your local community.
- The most common type of summer work is within the hospitality industry; agency's such as [fest staff](#) or [Hospitalitystaff.co.uk](#) recruit for a whole range of roles from checking tickets to serving food and security across loads of different festivals and events.
- Individual venues also take on extra staff over the busy summer period; for example the [Royal Albert Hall](#) which hosts the [Proms](#) between July and September and who is currently looking for stewards to help out.
- If you're more interested in an experience and less worried about the money, why not try volunteering; [UCL Volunteering](#) is right here on campus to help out and organisations like the [Volunteer England](#) have special sections on [volunteering for the Olympics](#).
- Many of the museums, galleries and concert halls will be looking for volunteers over summer; for example the [Royal Festival Hall on the Southbank](#) who are looking for extra volunteers for their [Festival of the World](#).

The Globe to Globe Festival – 37 Shakespeare Plays in 37 Languages

The '[Globe to Globe Festival](#)' opened on the 21st April at [Shakespeare's Globe Theatre](#). His unprecedented programme of multi-lingual Shakespeare productions are part of the once-in-a-lifetime celebration for the [London 2012 Festival](#).

It is a carnival of stories performed by **37 international companies** who will present every one of Shakespeare's plays in a different language over a six weeks period. Languages include: Albanian, Arabic, Armenian, Belarusian, Brazilian Portuguese, British Sign Language, Cantonese, Dari Persian, English, French, Georgian, German, Greek, Gujarati, Hebrew, Hindi, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Lithuanian, Macedonian, Mandarin, Maori, Polish, Russian, Serbian, Shona, Spanish, Swahili, Turkish, Urdu and Yoruba.

There are inspirational stories – companies who work underground and in war zones like the **Belarus Free Theatre** who hold their rehearsals and performances secretly due to the risk of persecution, or **Roy-e-Sabs from Afghanistan** who are performing *The Comedy of Errors* in Dari Persian despite having their rehearsal space attacked in Kabul. There are momentous stories – the first ever visit to these shores of some of the world's most prestigious national theatres, like **the National Theatre of China** performing Shakespeare's horror show of power and paranoia, *Richard III*. The company has not visited the UK before and its trailblazing productions represent the new face of Chinese theatre. There are returning stories

And above all there are the plays themselves, plays which have travelled far and wide and which on their travels have initiated new theatre cultures, spread light and laughter and helped nations, new and old, to define themselves. Information for Students on Tier 4 Visas

Immigration changes in effect from 6 April 2012

On 13th February 2012 the Government issued a [Statement of Intent](#) about its plans to make changes to Tier 4 Students and Tier 1 Post-study work routes of the points-based system. **These changes came into effect on 6th April 2012.**

Five year cap on study at degree level and above for Tier 4 students

From 6th April 2012 if you are making an application to renew your Tier 4 student

of the different immigration routes available to you if you wish to work in the UK after your studies.

visa, the grant of leave you are applying for should not result in you spending more than five years as a student at degree level or above in the UK. Time spent as a student in the UK will include all previous time spent studying at degree level or above in the UK as a Tier 4 (General) student and/or as a student under the pre-Tier 4 rules.

Some programmes are exempted from these immigration changes, including Architecture and Medicine. Please refer to the [UK Border Agency Immigration Rules](#) point 245ZXV (ga) and the [Tier 4 Policy Guidance](#) paragraph 87, version 04/2012 for the full list of exempt programmes.

The five year limit will be extended to six years if you are studying on a Master's level programme after having completed a degree programme in the UK that was at least four academic years long. This extension will also apply if you have completed a year in industry/placement that was integrated into your programme of study or if you have undertaken a study abroad year.

However, this exception will not apply to you if you need to extend your leave to repeat parts of your programme or re-sit exams. The UK Border Agency will only look into granting you further leave exceeding the time limit in "*compelling and compassionate circumstances*" such as serious injury and disability.

If you find that you are affected by these immigration changes and do not have enough leave to complete your programme, please contact [UCLU Rights and Advice](#) for further guidance.

PhD students

If you are a PhD student, you are exempt from the time limit during the period of your studies. However, once you have completed your PhD, you will not be granted any further leave under Tier 4 if this further leave would result in you spending more than eight years in the UK as a Tier 4 (General) student. Time spent as a student under the pre-Tier 4 rules will not be counted.

Further information, including the current fees for applying to extend your Tier 4 visa in the UK and the maintenance requirements can be found on the UCL's [Renewing your visa webpage](#).

Working in the UK after your studies

The [Tier 1 \(Post-study work\)](#) route closed to all new applicants at 5pm on 5 April 2012. If you have a pending application submitted before that time it will be considered under the UK Border Agency's rules and guidance in place at the time of submission.

Tier 2 (General) route

From 6th April 2012, if you are a recent graduate with a Bachelor's or Master's degree, PhD, or a PGCE or PGDE, you may be able to apply under the new provision of the [Tier 2 \(General\)](#) route. In order to qualify you need to be in the UK with a current student visa and have a job offer from an employer who holds a [Tier 2 Sponsor License](#) with a salary of at least £20,000, or the minimum appropriate rate set out in the relevant [Code of Practice](#), whichever is the higher.

If you are a PhD student you can switch into this route from Tier 4 if you have completed at least 12 months of study. All other students must have completed their studies and have been awarded their qualification in order to qualify.

Tier 1 (Graduate entrepreneur) route

UCL has applied to UK Border Agency to be a sponsor of this new Tier 1 route and if successful, expect to sponsor **up to 10 students a year**. As soon as UCL receive confirmation of this, further information will be given. Below is a brief outline of the [Tier 1 \(Graduate Entrepreneur\)](#) route.

If you have completed a degree programme at UCL and wish to stay in the UK to develop ideas by setting up a business here, you may be able to apply under the [Tier 1 \(Graduate Entrepreneur\)](#) route. In order to qualify you will need to be sponsored by UCL and be in the UK.

If your application is successful, you will be granted an initial leave of 12 months which then can be extended to a total of 24 months if UCL is satisfied with your progress. You will be allowed to take employment for up to 20 hours a week in addition to the time spent developing your business. At the end of the second year you will need to have funds of £50,000 if you wish to switch to [Tier 1 \(Entrepreneur\)](#) category.
