What is Skills4Work?

Skills4Work is an initiative aiming to give all UCL students the opportunity to meet UK employers and help them identify the skills needed to start a career after leaving UCL.

How can Skills4Work help me find a job after my studies?

Skills4Work offers you a range of interactive workshops, panel discussions and employer-led coaching free of charge during your studies at UCL or as a [UCL Gradclub Member](#).

You can hear company representatives talk about their personal experience of looking for a job, the selection and recruitment requirements of the employers they represent, and the corporate culture. All group sessions are followed up by networking where you can talk in person with the presenters and ask questions.

If you are looking to apply for your visa extension before Christmas, remember to [request a CAS number](#) as soon as possible. UCL will be closed during the Christmas period, for both students and staff from 5.30pm on Friday 21 December 2012 to 8am on Wednesday 2 January, during this period CAS requests will not be processed.

As soon as you are issued with your visa extension, you are required to bring it with your passport to the Student Centre. One of the

advisers in the Student Centre will add the details to your record and keep a copy for your file.

The Student Centre is based on the Ground Floor of the Chadwick Building and is open from 10am - 4pm Monday to Friday.

Culture & entertainment during the Christmas period

Lets go to the Panto



■ At this time of year people who do not normally see shows are flocking to the theatre with their families. And what is drawing them to the world of drama? It is pantomime.

Pantomime, meaning “imitating all”, was a popular art form in Ancient Greece and it included aspects of comedy, drama and romance.

■ Pantomimes have now become traditional English plays performed over the Christmas period. There are certain conventions that have to be followed and so pantomimes have to include the following elements:

- They are based on fairy tales, such as Cinderella or Snow White, or English folklore, like Robin Hood or Dick Whittington.
- The main male character has to be played by a woman whereas the older female character has to be played by a man in drag, commonly known as the dame.
- All the characters wear colourful costumes except the baddies who are normally dressed in black and look almost ghost-like.
- There is often an animal played by actors, or a pantomime horse or cow, played by two actors, one at the front and one at the back.
- There are set pieces such as an audience participation song and responses elicited from the audience such as a pantomime character saying “oh no it is isn’t” and the audience responding “oh yes it is” or shouting “he’s behind you”.
- There are songs galore, slapstick routines, magic and mystery, and childish jokes and pranks.
- At the end of the pantomime the evil people are defeated and everyone is happy with the main characters ending up married off to each other, culminating in an upbeat song and dance routine.

In recent years, stars of TV and film have taken to appearing in pantomimes, as well as famous stars from America. For example, David Hasselhoff and Dallas’ Patrick Duffy have travelled to the UK to appear in pantomimes. This year, David is back as Captain Hook in Peter Pan up in Manchester, whilst Elvis’ wife, Priscilla Presley, is appearing as the Wicked Queen in Snow White in a theatre in Wimbledon. Actors who are normally associated with Shakespearean tragedies such as Ian McKellen (Gandalf in the Lord of the Rings trilogy) have also turned their hands to pantomime for a bit of fun.

So, if you are interested, why not sample a traditional English pantomime? You will probably find it difficult to understand what it is all about but suspend reality for an hour or two, imagine you are dreaming and let the spectacle immerse you for the evening.

It is a great night out – “oh yes it is” “oh no it isn’t”.
