**Mario Gousse** was born in Ayiti and is a science educator in the UK. He is currently setting up the Jan Jak Desalin Imperial Institute, in Ayiti. Mario is a long-standing member of the Haiti Support Group Executive Committee.



**Patrick Sylvain** is a Haitian-American poet, writer, photographer, social and literary critic who has published widely on Haitian, Haitian diaspora culture, politics, language, and religion. Sylvain is a lecturer at Brown University's Africana Studies and Brandeis University's AAAS. He is the Shirle Dorothy Robbins Creative Writing Prize Fellow at Brandeis University completing his PhD in English. His new bilingual poetry collection *Unfinished Dreams /Rèv San Bout* will be published in October 2021. He is the leading author of the forthcoming *Education Across Borders: Immigration, Race, and Identity in the Classroom* (February 2022).



**Tamlynn Torchon** is a 2018 University of North Florida's graduate, having earned a bachelor's degree in International Studies with a focus on International Relations and Politics. She currently resides in Petion-Ville (Haiti) and works at Malteser International [INGO].
