Context

The UCL Institute of the Americas (UCL-IA) is a leading multidisciplinary specialist institution for the study of Latin America, the United States, the Caribbean and Canada. In the UK it acts as a focal point for students and researchers seeking to develop in-depth regional and continental knowledge of the Americas. As a centre for Postgraduate study specializing in the social sciences and modern history of the Americas, it offers two undergraduate degree programmes, six taught postgraduate degree programmes, and provides specialist supervision to doctoral level on a wide range of topics and all four main regions of the Americas. The Institute collaborates with colleagues across UCL, including in the science departments; in the University of London; and across the UK to create a centre of excellence in research, teaching, research facilitation and public policy formulation on the Americas.

As part of its mission to promote specialist regional and comparative knowledge of the Americas, the Institute complements its teaching and research programmes by creating, supporting and coordinating national and international scholarly networks. It actively participates in knowledge exchange/public engagement, and organises its own programme of public lectures, seminars and specialist symposia serving the scholarly, diplomatic and public policy communities. The Institute has a Visiting Fellowship scheme and manages and edits the Palgrave Macmillan Series *Studies of the Americas*.

Located in central London, in the heart of Bloomsbury at 51 Gordon Square, the Institute of the Americas is within a ten-minute walk to the British Museum, and in addition to UCL's own world class library collection, it is close to the other major collections including the Senate House Library and the British Library. All staff are provided with networked computer with access to a vast portfolio of electronic research resources. Within UCL there are opportunities for collaboration with, among others, the Departments of History, Politics, Geography, Anthropology, Spanish and Latin American Studies and the Development Planning Unit.

Administrative duties are shared among members of the academic staff in such a way that in any given year most have at least one major and some minor administrative duties. The Department and UCL as a whole attach particular importance to the pastoral care of students and to providing a friendly and welcoming environment for their studies. Additionally, the Institute is community-minded and embodies a collegial spirit. A rotating system of sabbatical leave is in operation within the Department, in accordance with UCL sabbatical policy, such that each member of academic staff can normally apply for leave for at least one teaching term every fourth year.

Main purpose of the job

- a) To carry out teaching, research facilitation, knowledge transfer, and course administration within the Institute relating to sustainable development in Latin America and the Caribbean, and in particular, the underlying social, political and economic dimensions of environmental change and the contested character of discourses of the environment as they emerge and change over time.
- b) To teach on a Master's course 'Sustainable Development in Latin America and the Caribbean'.

Duties and responsibilities Main duties and Responsibilities

- To deliver teaching (lectures, seminars, and tutorials) for one MA option 'Sustainable Development in Latin America and the Caribbean' in term 2.
- To act as module leader for the above MA module.
- To provide academic and pastoral support for students, including 1 hour of office hours per week in term-time in term 2.
- To assess and give feedback on students' course-work on the MA module delivered in Term 2, and to act as moderator for assessment undertaken by other UCL-IA colleagues.
- To assist with quality assurance procedures.
- To set seminar assignments in a timely manner.
- To manage courses and course material using Moodle (virtual learning environment) as a teaching and learning tool.

- To attend Department, Exam Board and other meetings as required/invited.
- To participate in the College training programme for new teaching staff as appropriate.

Other Duties

- The post holder will actively follow UCL policies including Equal Opportunities policies. The post holder will also maintain an awareness and observation of Fire and Health & Safety Regulations.
- The post holder will carry out any other duties as are within the scope, spirit and purpose of the job as requested by the Institute Director.

The job description reflects the present requirements of the post, and as duties and responsibilities change/develop, the job description will be reviewed and be subject to amendment in consultation with the postholder
