## 3-Year Full-Time PhD Studentship in spatial data analysis of health geographies at the Space Syntax Lab, Bartlett School of Architecture

Applications are invited for a **3-year PhD Studentship** on *The built environment and adolescent mental health* starting September 2023 on the <u>Architectural Space & Computation MPhil/PhD programme</u> in the Bartlett School of Architecture. The studentship comprises UK standard postgraduate full-time student fees for 3 years, plus a maintenance stipend (current rate for 2022/23: £17,668). The deadline for application is Friday 16<sup>th</sup> January at 4pm. Interviews will take place in late January.

## **Subject Area**

We are seeking a candidate with strong spatial data analytical skills, who is interested in researching how the spatial layout of the built environment shapes mental health in adolescents.

The candidate will be supported in developing a broad characterisation of Bradford's spatial geography, in order to analyse the relationship between mental health and factors such as access to green space, proximity to local high streets, or social connectivity. Access to data on the health of children in Bradford will be provided by the Born in Bradford project. The research will contribute to the development of built environment indicators for the Connected Bradford project, which links up routine health, social and educational data on over 530,000 Bradford residents

Applicants will be co-supervised by a team led by <u>Professor Laura Vaughan</u> at the Space Syntax Lab, UCL Bartlett School or Architecture, with <u>Professor Rosie McEachan</u>, Director of the <u>Born in Bradford cohort study</u>, and visiting Professor at UCL, alongside UCL experts in spatial data science and mental health inequalities.

Applicants must meet the requirements for home fee status. <sup>1</sup> Candidates must hold (or be close to completion) a relevant master's degree (subjects such as GIS, space syntax, geography). Familiarity with health geographies is an advantage, as is experience with the coding languages: R, Python, or PostGIS.
