

Our locations

Situated in the heart of London, The Bartlett draws on the capital's numerous experts and facilities, and takes advantage of the flow of international built environment researchers and practitioners through the city.

The Bartlett is also based at Here East, a 1.2 million square foot complex in London's Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park. In 2016, UCL acquired 3,000 square metres of studio space at Here East to undertake ground-breaking research in topics such as architecture, infrastructure, transport and robotics.

Our designated Bartlett Library is located on the ground floor of Central House, 14 Upper Woburn Place – close to the centre of campus. The Library offers a mix of silent and group work study spaces, and houses books, journals and DVDs covering all of The Bartlett's teaching and research interests.

Any student can become a rep. There are several different roles, each with their own responsibilities. All reps work closely with staff in their Department, The Bartlett Faculty and/or the Students' Union to make positive changes across UCL. Being a rep demonstrates your motivation and commitment to achieving the best possible UCL experience for you and your peers. You'll work alongside fellow reps from your department, build collaborative relationships with staff and receive exclusive training from the Students' Union. Reps are appointed during early October – speak to staff in your department to get involved. **You can also influence who takes on these roles by voting in rep elections** →

In addition to your personal tutor, you can approach your Year Coordinator or Department Tutor within the Department. Your programme administrator will be able to tell you who this is.

If you wish to speak to someone outside your Department at Faculty level, we have Faculty Graduate Tutors for Taught and Research Students.



If you are a Masters student, our Faculty Graduate Tutor for taught postgraduate students is Peter McLennan. Peter is available by appointment to see students, and can provide advice on academic administration (e.g. visas), academic policy (e.g. extenuating circumstances) and pastoral issues including mental health and bereavement.
