- Political interest and will to recognise the problem
- Public opinion and support
- A compelling case for change that recognised the costs and consequences of inaction
- Sustained financial investment

## But...

- It locked us into an inflexible 19<sup>th</sup> century solution that struggles with 21<sup>st</sup> century challenges
