




Explaining the consent form

We're sorry it's so long and with lots of legal words. Hopefully this will help explain it a bit more. Each number matches a number on the consent form.

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- 1) Consent = agreeing to take part
 - 2) Voluntary = it's your choice

- The first option is to check you know that the study is about going to the GP and you understand what will happen.
 - It's a half day workshop where you will be talking about going to the GP and making a podcast about your discussion.
 - It's totally your choice to take part and you can change your mind at any point
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- 3) Pseudonym = fake name
 - 4) Personal information = details about you
 - 5) Withdrawing = deleting
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- You can choose a name or be called 'anonymous'. We would use this when we use your words in the report.
- We're checking you know about what information we're collecting (if you choose to answer the questions).
- We will ask you if you're male or female, your age, and your ethnicity (e.g. Asian).
- It's helpful if you can answer these, but you don't have to. There are laws around how we use this information and we will make sure nobody can work out who you are from how we write about the workshops.
- If you give us this information and change your mind, you have two weeks to let us know and we will delete it. After two weeks we will have already processed this information so we won't be able to delete it.

6) Withdrawing after the workshop

- You have two weeks to change your mind after the workshop
- If you decide to do this we can take what you have said out of the podcast
- But we will use the recording for our report because it is a group discussion so it's difficult to take just one person out of it.



7) Choosing to use my voice in the podcast

- You can decide during the workshop if you want your voice to be used
- You can still take part in the workshop whatever you decide
- If you'd like your words to be said, we can have someone else read them out for you

9) Editing the podcast



The facilitator and the researcher will put together the final podcast from the recordings made on the day



You will be able to give feedback about what you think of the final version.

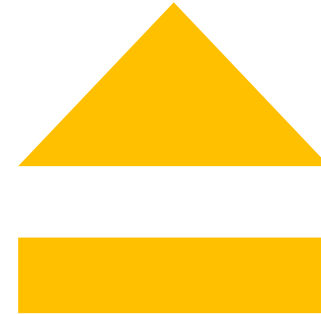


We will talk to you at the workshop about how this will work

10) transcription = write-up of the discussion



We will record the workshop both for the podcast but also so we can analyse what was said. We only record so we can type up the words.



Once we've typed up the words, we delete the recording

11) Commercial organisations = businesses

12) Monitoring and audit = other people at the university where we work

- These parts are telling you who has access to your information.
- We won't sell anything from this study to businesses.
- Sometimes (but hardly ever) our computers are monitored so things from the workshops may be read by someone who is not on the research team. But they still work at the university and still have to keep what they read confidential.

13) Future research = other work we do



14) Benefit financially = get paid



We do lots of related research about young people and their health. It's useful if we can use what we find out from one study in another.



We would share the write-up of the workshop (so someone will type up the words people said from the recording) with other people in the team to use. No one would know who had taken part.



This is to check you have chosen to take part and you aren't getting paid. We are offering vouchers, but this is different from getting paid like for a job.

15) Report = description of what we did and what we found



You don't have to have a copy of the report
but if you'd like to, just let us know.
