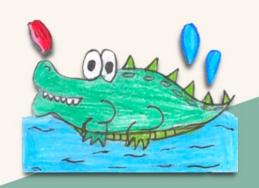

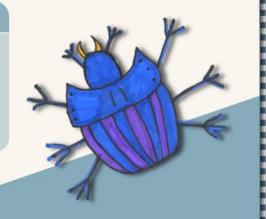
Crocodile

Grant Museum of Zoology

The Grant Museum of Zoology is a natural history museum and part of University College London. It was established by Robert Edmond Grant in 1828 as a teaching collection of zoological specimens for students to learn from, and for biological exams. The museum has around 68,000 objects and has been in continuous use by students at UCL since 1828. It first opened to the public in 1996.

This architectural artifact was found by the archaeologist in the temple of Nubt. There are 22 pieces of the stone artifacts put together.

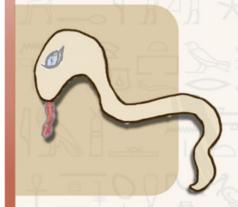

Petrie Museum of Egyptian and Sudanese Archaeology

The Petrie Museum is one of four museums at University College London. It has over 80,000 objects and is one of the world's leading Egyptian and Sudanese archaeological collections. The museum was created in 1892 by the writer and archaeologist Amelia Edwards. The objects discovered by William Flinders Petrie and his team of Egyptian excavators make up most of the collection.
