


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

Impropera presents: Muso

Kensal Green Cemetary

(1833) London's first garden cemetery, includes a royal mausoleum in the Egyptian style, and pylon style tombs and obelisklis. Tube: Kensal Green

Highgate Cemetary

(1839) Impressive tombs but most Egyptian is the Egyptian Avenue with a Pharcanic arch, flanked either side by two columns with lotus bud capitals. Only accessible by tour. Tube: Highgate

Hoover Factory

(1931-38) designed by Wallis Gilbert & Partners, decorated with bright coloured faience (glazed ceramic inspired by Ancient Egypt). The Tesco behind is designed to match. Tube: Perivale

Richmond Park

Late 18th C Obelisks in Richmond Park. Tube & Rail: Richmond

Kilmorey Mausoleum

(1853) Egyptian style Kilmorey Mausoleum and Natural Park in St Margarets - only open special days, Rail: St Margaret's



Carlton Cinema

(1930) on the Essex Road by architect George Coles façade in form of an Egyptian 'pylon' temple and decorated with lotus flowers and buds and brightly-coloured ceramic tiles. Rail: Essex Rd

Cleopatra's Needle

in the Embankment from Heliopolis (near Cairo) via Alexandria in Egypt c. 1450BCE. Tube: Embankment Station

(1891) Bedouin tent style tomb of the explorer Richard Burton at St. Mary Magdalen's Mortlake. Rail: Mortlake

Brompton Cemetary

(1840) Now a Royal Park that includes some pylon style tombs and obelisks. Tube: Brompton



Abney Park

(1840) The gates of Abney Park Cemetery in Egyptian Revival style designed by William Hosking FSA in collaboration with J.Bonomi the Younger and the cemetery's founder George Collison II. Rail: Stoke Newington

Carreras Factory

(1926-28). Egyptian-style ornamentation with two gigantic effigies of black cats (Black Cat Cigarettes) flanking the entrance and colourful painted details (the cats are replicas of ones lost in the 1960s). Tube: Mornington Crescent

Adelaide House

(early 1920s) near London Bridge by Sir John Burnet in Art Deco style with an allegorical stone figure and Egyptian touches (columns, pylon style arch, decoration). Tube / Rail: London Bridge / Monument

Crystal Palace Park Sphinx

(1853-5) remnants of the Ancient Egyptian Court and decoration at the Crystal Palace Park. O/ground & Rail: Penge West or Crystal Palace



West Norwood Cemetary

(1837) is one of the great Victorian cemeteries with superb funerary monuments; Greek and Egyptian influenced monuments can be found in the Greek Section. Rail: West Norwood.


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




Overall Age Profile








Geffrye Museum
