2023 marks the thirteenth year of the European Institute's existence. From humble beginnings, we have developed into UCL's go-to hub for all things Europe – a Jean Monnet Centre of Excellence fostering a flourishing research environment, developing innovative education formats, extending the reach and impact of academic expertise beyond the university, and advising senior leadership.

This past academic year, we have delivered an unprecedentedly rich and varied programme in all four of our areas of strategic focus.

We have worked closely with the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office and the EU Delegation to the United Kingdom to host youth summits and diplomatic training events, while running a Commission on how to build the capacity of our country and regional experts to inform policy.

We have offered a suite of innovative teaching offers, from our hugely popular practitioner-led masterclasses to site-specific undergraduate teaching abroad, and stimulated debate and new work on topics ranging from the architecture of politics in Europe to how we challenge the presumption of whiteness in contemporary European studies.

With a small core team, the invaluable support of students who learn and grow with us, and an ever-increasing network of scholars and external stakeholders, we are putting UCL ideas and expertise to work in the world.

In this way, despite the size of our footprint, we understand ourselves as both an institution and an institution builder. After all, as per the Oxford English Dictionary, an institution is both the action of founding something and at the same time its outcome: an established organisation. It is a regulative principle, which serves the needs of an organised community. Also once carrying connotations of education and instruction, of science and art (*Nature..is a thynge of great myght and efficacye, but surely institution or bringynge vp, is moche mightier*, R. Taverner 1539), an institution gives form and order to a thing.

There's certainly something attractive about describing our work in terms of building practice, as we are shaping the edifice of the university's work on, in and with Europe – across domains, historical periods, and disciplines.

To appropriate a quote by the anthropologist Emma Crewe, which we cited in our latest book *Parliament Buildings* (UCL Press, 2023), you can't study Europe without

a sense of architecture to fathom the building; geography to consider how people navigate space and place; history to see what unfolds over time including movements in power, relationships or values; linguistics for perusing speechifying and written texts; legal studies if tracking law-making; psychology to uncover the pressures people face and how they respond to them and so on.

Perhaps we even bring a small dose of what Max Weber – in On Charisma and *Institution Building* – termed 'charismatic authority': a flourish, perhaps at times a touch unruly, that nonetheless seeks to heighten the standing of the institution.

Of course, all institution-builders need to factor in a certain amount of flexibility to accommodate potential seismic shocks in the external environment, whether they be geopolitical or social, policy-related or organisational. Institutions cannot remain static. They need to evolve – strategically, responsively, organically.

At a time when the principles of liberal democracy and the social welfare state, interstate relationships, culture wars and environmental futures all make daily headlines, higher education institutions certainly have their work cut out for them.

In this fluid environment, the European Institute continues to adapt – and it remains determined to keep working away on building the foundations, supporting the structures, and showcasing the rather impressive ornaments of UCL's academic work on Europe.

The dynamism of the European Institute is astonishing, from policy partnerships and the rule of law to Youth Summits and European Literary London.

It focuses and magnifies the value of UCL's European work by bringing diverse and lively people together, both internally and across our continent.

UCL is proud of its **diverse community** of European staff and students. **9%** of the student population, **10%** of our alumni and **20%** of the staff population come from EU countries.






UCL enjoys **close partnerships** with leading universities and research organisations across Europe, from KU Leuven and SciencesPo to the Max Planck Society, and influences EU policy through LERU, the Russell Group and Universities UK. Between 2018-2022, UCL-European research partnerships generated over 34,000 co-publications.



UCL has benefited from **EU funding**, **programmes and networks**: UCL was the 4th most successful higher education institution in securing EU research funding under Horizon 2020, and remains, despite the UK's delayed association, the 9th most successful organisation, under Horizon Europe.

Spotlight on a Commission on Policy Engagement by Area Experts

From the Institute of the Americas to the School of Slavonic and East European Studies, UCL is a world-leading centre for academic area expertise.

Academics with country or regional expertise already inform policy locally, nationally and internationally. However, in the context of increasing interest from external stakeholders, Lucy Shackleton and Dr Ben Noble (Associate Professor, Russian Politics, UCL SSEES) codelivered a Commission on Policy Engagement by Area Experts, funded by UCL Public Policy, to identify opportunities to strengthen the policy engagement capacity of the UCL country and regional experts. The Commission's key activities and outputs were:

 A review of UCL's area expertise, producing a directory of experts featuring almost 1,000 UCL colleagues, which has already been used to inform a major funding bid and to help identify expertise in relation to requests from journalists and policy partners.

- An in-depth internal consultation, including three workshops, 26 individual interviews and a survey eliciting over 100 responses.
- Pilot activities to test innovative models for policy engagements and enhance UCL's visibility in this area, from a demand-led series of roundtables on the implications of Russia's invasion of Ukraine for FCDO and Cabinet Office, to hosting a joint diplomatic training exercise for UK and French diplomats.
- Interviews with a range of external partners and 'critical friends', including alumni working in relevant policy roles.
- A report addressing both policy engagement by area experts and more broadly, currently under consideration by UCL senior leadership.

We support UCL's teaching excellence on Europe through innovative, practice-led and site-specific education and by creating exciting opportunities for students.



Spotlight on European Politics, Policy and Law in Practice

This year, we delivered the module on European Politics, Policy and Law in Practice for a second year running, as part of the MSc in European Politics and Policy. In a departure from more conventional modules, this module is taught through a curated programme of moderated conversations with policy practitioners, combined with skills-oriented sessions led by experienced professionals. Students benefit from the European Institute's strong networks across the EU policymaking community, while also trying their hand at producing policy briefs, policy pitches, speeches and blogs.

This year's module included a three-day study trip to Brussels, featuring bespoke seminars, on topics from climate and sustainability policy to UK-EU trade relations, as well as skills sessions, a visit to the EU institutions and a networking reception with alumni, hosted by the UK Mission to the EU.

32 senior practitioners from a diverse range of backgrounds contributed, to overwhelmingly positive student feedback.

The module was a great opportunity to put into practice the theories and concepts we studied to see how these translated into policy making at the EU and beyond.

The guest lecturers and stakeholders in Brussels offered valuable insight on how things work behind the scenes in the EU institutions, and it was fantastic to network with UCL alumni working in Brussels and better understand the career options available with a European Politics degree.


I particularly enjoyed the innovative methods of assessment and the practical sessions on writing policy briefs and blog posts, which will no doubt be helpful in the future.

Barcelona Summer School

Working with a range of local hosts, including the Fundació Miró and the Institut Ramon Llull, the module featured site-specific learning and teaching to advance creative-critical expression, including an arts workshop, guided walks, a roundtable with literary translators and language training.

The credit-bearing module was aimed at undergraduate students in the School of European Languages, Culture and Society (SELCS) and in European and International Social and Political Studies (EISPS). It was part of a suite of Turing Summer Schools in European cities, which we helped conceptualise.

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

Enhancing the research environment

Through our academic work, by coordinating cross-disciplinary initiatives and by hosting Visiting Professors, the European Institute fosters an environment where research on Europe can flourish.



Jean Monnet Centre of Excellence

This year we successfully concluded our Jean Monnet Centre of Excellence programme, 2019-2023: Passionate Politics and the Future of Europe.

The status, which we have been awarded by the European Union under the Erasmus+ programme since 2016, consolidates the UCL European Institute as a focal point of competence on EU affairs – at UCL, in the UK and globally.

Under the Jean Monnet Centre programme, we delivered conferences, workshops, publications, policy reports, short films and podcasts on themes as diverse as the rule of law, how small states can gain influence in the EU, the architecture of politics and EU-UK relations.

We also recently celebrated the renewal of the status for the 2023-2026 period. The new programme is structured around four thematic work packages, each of which addresses a topical policy field for today's EU: European Identity, Diversity, Energy and Security.



Spotlight on Jean Monnet Centre activities:

Rule of Law in Europe

In collaboration with Dr Oliver Gerstenberg and Prof. Ronan McCrea, Dr Claudia Sternberg convened a full-day workshop aimed at advancing our understanding of the role of the rule of law in the European Union, in the context of democratic backsliding of recent years. The workshop facilitated in-depth discussions of pioneering work amongst a select group of over 14 leading specialists and legal and policy practitioners.

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I am delighted to have had the chance to participate in the workshop on the Rule of Law in Europe where a good mix of practitioners, academics from various disciplines and students were in attendance. The really well put together programme and excellent contributions by outstanding specialists fostered a lively debate and an insightful exchange of ideas throughout the day. I am sure that such meaningful discussions will prove an important stepping stone for further research developments in such a critical field of contemporary legal knowledge.

PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS THE ARCHITECTURE OF POLITICS IN EUROPE Edited by Sophia Psarra, Uta Staiger and Claudia Sternberg

Parliament Buildings: The Architecture of Politics in Europe

This book represents the first comparative, multi-disciplinary study of parliament buildings across Europe and across history. We brought together academic experts from a wide range of disciplinary backgrounds with members of parliaments and architects who designed four parliament buildings in Europe to raise a host of challenging questions. How do parliament buildings give physical form to norms and practices, to behaviours, rituals, identities and imaginaries? How are their spatial forms influenced by the political cultures they accommodate? What kinds of histories, politics and morphologies do the diverse European parliaments share, and how do their political trajectories intersect?

Working with Professor Sophia Psarra, of the UCL Bartlett School of Architecture, Drs Uta Staiger and Claudia Sternberg delivered:

- A 500-page, open access edited volume published with UCL Press;
- Two two-day international online conferences;
- A research documentary film featuring ethnographic interviews with UK and German parliamentarians.

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Parliament Buildings is a brilliant interdisciplinary exploration of a fascinating topic. Theoretically sophisticated, empirically rich and historically informed, it demonstrates the multiple ways in which politics and the built environment intersect, and sheds light on the symbolic and material practices central to contemporary representative politics.

Enhancing the research environment





Black Europe

[Black Europe] is a research initiative designed to challenge the presumption of whiteness in the study of Europe.

Supported by the UCL Institute of Advanced Studies (IAS), and under the academic stewardship of Hélène Neveu-Kringelbach and Jeff Bowersox, we launched a series of research workshops on Black Europe, with the aims of sharing and stimulating empirical and conceptual work, exploring formats of engagement, and addressing institutional ramifications.

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The international resonance of Black Lives Matter movements in 2020 raised a stark and long overdue challenge to conventional ways of understanding and researching Europe. The European Institute has taken up this challenge through the [Black Europe] workstream, which in 2022-23 organised a series of workshops that built connections among advanced scholars, early career researchers, and postgraduate students scattered in departments across UCL. This sought to interrogate concepts of Europe and Blackness alike and lay the groundwork for further collaborative work among scholars, students, and creative artists.

Spotlight on Music Futures

Music Futures is an initiative dedicated to thinking, writing and performing music at UCL, jointly hosted with the Institute of Advanced Studies, with support from the UCL Grand Challenges.

Now in its second year, this innovative project has fostered collaborations between UCL researchers interested in music, establishing a community at UCL in the absence of a dedicated music department.

In 2022-23, Music Futures supported ten projects from the UCL academic community, spanning concerts, performances, events, workshops and a scheme facilitating collaborations with the Royal Academy of Music.

Fellowships have also been granted to two teams of researchers to conduct research at UCL PEARL (Person-Environment-Activity Research Laboratory).

This initiative has provided unique opportunities to connect with researchers across UCL who engage with music in highly creative and interdisciplinary ways. My own project has brought new dimensions to research on a recently discovered late-Renaissance Italian dramatist, poet and singer, Leonora Bernardi, through working with musicologists and early music practitioners. Following a UCL seminar, a public concert at the Foundling Museum presented the first ever performance of musical settings of Bernardi's verse and examples of her soundworld.

Extending UCL's reach

The European Institute fosters engagement with policy professionals, civil society and the public to maximise the reach and impact of UCL ideas and expertise on Europe. We have also placed an emphasis on leveraging our external networks to create new opportunities for UCL students.



We broker dialogue between UCL academics and policymakers, and curate opportunities to showcase UCL expertise

As part of work to support a UK-France Joint Diplomatic Training Exercise, we fielded Dr Melanie Garson, Associate Professor in International Conflict Resolution & International Security, UCL Department of Political Science, to provide a closing keynote at FCDO, on the impact of AI on geopolitics and diplomacy.







We build capacity among UCL academics to engage with policy stakeholders beyond the UK

As part of an ongoing collaboration with UCL Global Engagement and UCL Public Policy, we developed a suite of resources to support international policy engagement. We also provide a bespoke service to the Faculty of Laws, which has resulted in four Policy Briefs on topics ranging from the European Health Data Space to the inclusion of wastepickers in sustainable waste management policy.



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The EI and the Laws Policy brief programme gave me the platform and support to transform my research on the European Health Data Space into 'the UCL voice' on the matter. It amplified my voice and opened new pathways for lasting collaborations with policy advisors and MEPs. Today, amidst an avalanche of amendments and shadow meetings on the proposed legislation, I can witness the real impact of my – and UCL's – work. This is something very rewarding, especially for early-career researchers, and I am grateful for having had the opportunity and support to make it happen.

We leverage our external networks to create and convene opportunities for UCL students, with an interest in Europe

Through our rich network of external relationships, in Whitehall, Westminster, European Embassies and beyond, we work to create and convene opportunities which will enrich the UCL student experience. This year we have offered students the opportunity to submit to a film competition for the French Embassy's Night of Ideas, commissioned a range of student-led interviews with senior visitors to UCL. selected students to participate in a Franco-British policy dialogue at the French Residence, and hosted the first meeting of EU affairs societies at UK universities, in partnership with the Delegation of the EU to the United Kingdom and the UCL EISPS Student Society.


