## 2021-22: The Year in Review

Global governance appears to be stumbling from crisis to crisis. With the world still reeling from the Covid-19 pandemic, the ongoing war in Ukraine presents new escalating challenges as it puts additional strain on overstretched humanitarian relief efforts, disrupts critical supply chains, and further destabilises an already precarious global security order. Meanwhile, recent heatwaves and intensifying extreme weather events around the world serve as a sobering reminder of our collective failure to respond effectively to the unfolding climate and nature emergency. We now have less than eight years left before 2030, the year by which global leaders have pledged to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and fully align climate action with the goals of the Paris Agreement. It is more critical than ever that governance efforts on all scales use disruptive events as a lever for systemic change – rather than an excuse to revert to business-as-usual – whilst also building up resilience in the face of an increasingly uncertain future.

How can we make sense of these complex, compounding challenges and chart a workable course forward? This is the overarching question the UCL Global Governance Institute (GGI) continued to grapple with in 2021-22. In collaboration with our partners at UCL and beyond, we have advanced our core mission to provide in-depth, cross-disciplinary research and public outreach activities on a wide range of global challenges.

We are particularly keen to involve students and young people in these efforts, given that they will be disproportionately affected by policy decisions in many areas of global governance. Unfortunately, as former Irish President and prominent human rights advocate [Mary Robinson observed at a recent GGI event](#), genuine intergenerational exchange in global governance is still a rare

occurrence: “We should no longer be considering young people as an optional extra in decision making, nor should we see intergenerational dialogue as a box ticking exercise.” This sentiment was echoed by a diverse group of youth climate leaders who joined us for a student-led workshop, where they shared their personal experiences with trying to shape global climate negotiations and canvassed opportunities [for broader and more meaningful youth engagement](#).

We were also delighted to co-host the first Youth Global Governance Forum at UCL. The event, which was organised by the student-led Global Governance and Ethics (GGE) Society and supported by the Dean’s Strategic Funds, aimed at introducing A-level and undergraduate students to the field of global governance and providing a platform for young people to share their experiences and perspectives on the most pressing global challenges. As participating students highlighted, the provision of inclusive, high-quality [education on these challenges is vital to enhancing the agency of young people](#), who often feel overwhelmed, ignored and discouraged in the face of growing complexity and intensifying global crises. The event, which featured lively discussions in small breakout groups as well as interactive debate with UCL academics, was a great showcase for the value of engaging young people in the activities of the university and it is hoped that it will become an annual fixture.

Student engagement has also been an opportunity for us to gain fresh perspectives on the broad range of complex sustainability challenges we currently face. At the end of this academic year, we invited a cross-faculty group of UCL students to join us for a future scenario and ‘backcasting’ exercise, designed to disrupt familiar thinking patterns and gauge the potential for transformative change. We asked participating students to imagine a utopian

economic system – one that is environmentally and socially sustainable and does not rely on GDP growth – and then work backwards from this imagined future, charting a pathway of fictional events that produced system change. While it was not easy to shed chronological thinking patterns, the exercise turned out to be highly engaging and thought-provoking. Above all, as [one of the participating students reflected](#), it highlighted “the value of creative collaboration. Backcasting flips teleology on its head, uncovering radical possibilities within global governance and beyond.”

Beyond amplifying the voices of young people at UCL and beyond, the GGI has continued to promote wider public debate on the most pressing global governance challenges of our times. In 2021-22, our busy events programme tackled a range of urgent issues, including food governance, international security, the energy transition, the future of our economic system, the rise of China, the transformation of civic rebellion, and the changing architecture of global governance. We were fortunate to be joined by many prominent scholars, policy experts and public figures, among them Mary Robinson, Professor Jeffrey Sachs, Professor Michael Barnett, Professor Mark Beissinger, Professor Henrietta Moore and Professor Paul Ekins, to name but a few. Events were largely held online not just as a Covid-19 safety precaution but also to put into action our pledge to include more non-European speakers in our roster of activities, as well as to bring these events to the much expanded global audience the Institute has built during the pandemic. In addition to our events programme, [the GGI's podcast](#), co-hosted by (current and former) MSc Global Governance and Ethics students, has proven increasingly popular. Over the past 12 months, the podcast aired a total of 15 episodes, featuring in-depth conversations with leading academics and cutting-edge thinkers.

In fulfilling its core mission, the GGI has continued to bolster collaborations with a range of UCL-based, national and international partners. In 2021-22, the GGI team delivered its final contributions to the EU Horizon 2020 funded GLOBE project ("[Global Governance and the European Union: Future Trends and Scenarios](#)") in partnership with colleagues from leading research institutions around the world. GGI-led outputs, which focused on climate governance as well as the effectiveness and legitimacy of international organisations, have resulted in several journal publications this year, including in the *Journal of European Integration*, *Business Strategy and the Environment* and *Global Policy*, with other peer-reviewed publications in the works. The GGI has also been an active member of other research and policy networks, including the Jean Monnet Network on EU/China Global Economic Governance, the COP26 Universities Network, and the new UCL Climate Politics Cluster.

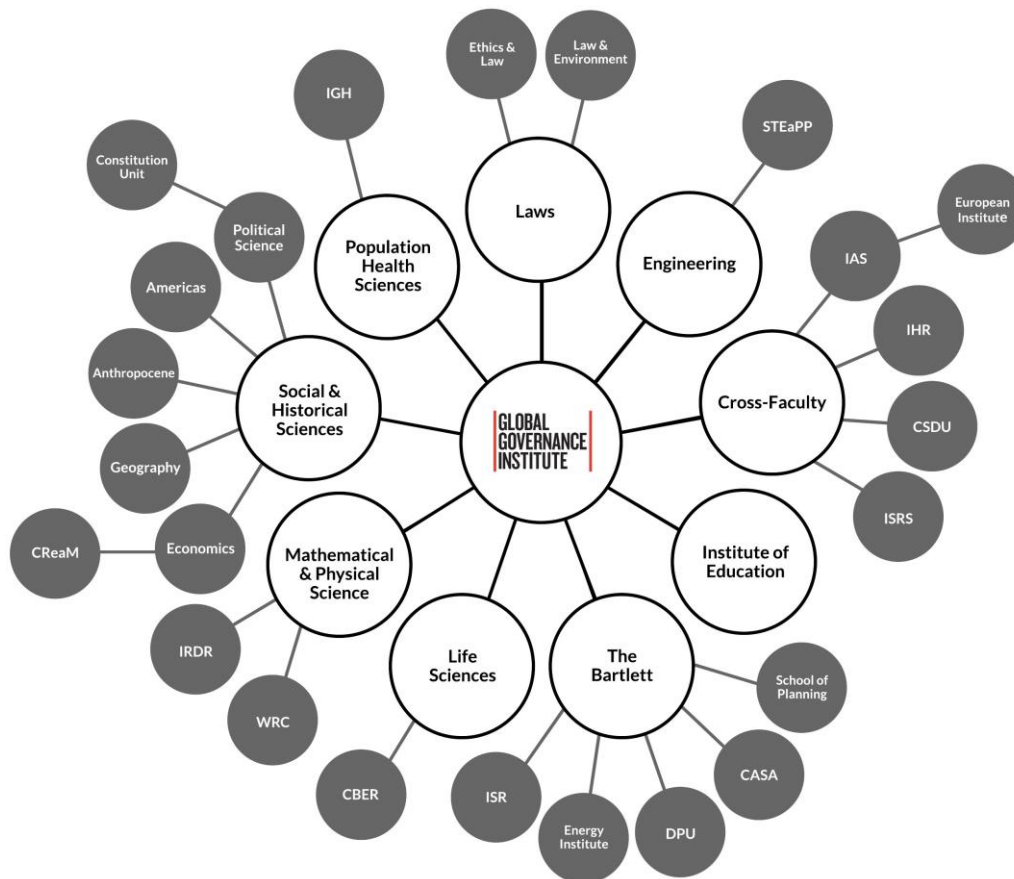
The GGI has also launched new collaborations with colleagues from across UCL and beyond, notably Dr Nick Hughes (UCL Institute for Sustainable Resources) and Dr Inken von Borzyskowski (UCL Political Science) – both of whom will join us as Thematic Directors in 2022-23 – as well as Professor Ben Cashore (Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy in Singapore). These and other partnerships have been enabled by generous grants from UCL Grand Challenges, UCL Global Engagement, as well as the Bartlett Research Grants Scheme (BRGS) and resulted in research and engagement activities on a range of key topics, including the debate on economic 'degrowth,' the need for complex biodiversity governance, and the contributions of participatory democracy to addressing the climate crisis. In addition, departmental cluster funding has been instrumental in allowing the GGI to expand and deepen collaborations with colleagues from the Department of Political Science, for instance through a joint workshop with the Climate Politics Cluster.

We are extremely grateful for the continued support from our current cohort of GGI Thematic Directors – Dr Zeynep Bulutgil and Dr Manuel Vogt (global security), Professor Barnali Choudhury (global justice and ethics), and Dr Julius Mugwagwa (global health) – that we received this year. We would also like to thank the many students across UCL who have contributed to GGI activities by writing commentaries, providing background research, and assisting in the organisation of events, with a special mention to Xuan Zi Han (BSc Philosophy, Politics and Economics) who led on the above-mentioned climate youth event.

The GGI's mission is closely aligned with all the principal themes of UCL's 2034 strategy and the thematic priorities of the UCL Grand Challenges programme. As we move into 2022-23, our focus will remain squarely on enabling and promoting high quality cross-disciplinary research and policy-focused debate on global societal problems, including climate change and biodiversity, international security, global health, as well as justice, equality and human rights. We look forward to pursuing novel opportunities for knowledge co-creation over the next academic year, leveraging UCL's unique global position and collaborative spirit.

# External Networks and Partnerships

In addition to collaborating with UCL colleagues across a wide span of disciplines, the GGI has forged strong links with external partners in research, policy and practice.

## Global Governance and the EU: Future Trends and Scenarios (GLOBE)



Funded by the European Commission's Horizon 2020 programme, GLOBE brings together an international consortium of 10 academic partners from 8 countries to explore future trends and scenarios in global governance. The GGI has led on a work package on climate change as well as cross-cutting research on the effectiveness and legitimacy of global governance.

## COP26 Universities Network



The COP26 Universities Network brought together more than 45 UK-based universities to help deliver ambitious outcomes at the 2021 UN Climate Summit (COP26) in Glasgow. After COP26, the GGI has continued to collaborate with network partners, including on a peer-reviewed publication on whole-system approaches to the 'just transition.'

## Jean Monnet Network on EU/China Global Economic Governance



Funded by a Jean Monnet Network grant, this research network brings together a multidisciplinary group of experts to assess the role of China and the EU in global economic governance. The network is coordinated by CEU San Pablo University and includes researchers from academic institutions across Europe and China.

## International Global Governance Network



The International Global Governance Network brings together individual researchers and academic institutions in the field of global governance around the world to discuss current trends in global governance scholarship and explore possibilities for scaling up collaboration.

## UK Network on the Prohibition of Torture



Launched in 2017, this network brings together leading practitioners, policy-makers and academics across the UK to scale up collaboration on the prohibition of torture and ill-treatment.

Beyond participation in the above networks, the GGI regularly collaborates with leading thinkers and academics across the world on events, workshop and specific research projects.

## Institute Achievements 2021-22

Thanks to the invaluable support of its broad network of partners, the GGI's profile as a leading centre of cross-disciplinary research, policy-focused analysis and public engagement continues to grow. 2021-22 has been a busy year for the Institute. We have deepened and expanded our network of collaborators at UCL and externally, including through continued engagement with individuals and partner institutions participating in the Horizon 2020 funded GLOBE project and the Jean Monnet Network on Global Economic Governance. Building on these and other collaborations, the GGI has made important contributions to global governance scholarship this year, advancing key research agendas on climate governance, multilevel governance, global governance effectiveness, and whole-systems approaches to the sustainability transition, among others.

Successful funding bids, including under the UCL Grand Challenges and the UCL Global Engagement grant schemes, have enabled us to further expand the GGI's active research areas. This has included, for example, the organisation of a high-level workshop on the debate between 'green growth' and 'degrowth,' which has resulted in a detailed research report and opportunities for future engagement with leading scholars on this issue. Promoting impactful public debate has also remained a core aim of the Institute. Our events programme has been as busy as ever, bringing together high-level keynote speakers and a diverse global audience. Last but not least, many of our activities this year have focused on engaging students and young people in the policy debates on pressing societal challenges, including through a youth-led workshop on climate governance, an interactive scenario exercise on the future of our economic systems, and the Institute's *Global Governance Futures* podcast.

### Institutional Strengthening

- Close collaboration with all GGI Thematic Directors – Dr Barnali Choudhury (Global Justice and Ethics), Dr Julius Mugwagwa (Global Health), Dr Zeynep Bulutgil and Dr Manuel Vogt (both Global Security) – on a range of research activities and public events, including two keynote lectures on the role of gender in electoral politics (Dr Dawn Teele) and the transformation of urban rebellion (Professor Mark R. Beissinger)
- Recruitment of two new Thematic Directors: Dr Nick Hughes (Global Environmental Sustainability) and Dr Inken von Borzyskowski (Global Security)
- Continued engagement with the GGI Academic Steering Board and Advisory Board, with several members facilitating or participating in GGI workshops and public events
- Deepened collaboration with various UCL faculties, departments and institutes, including – but not limited to – the Institute for Sustainable

Resources (ISR), the Bartlett School of Environment, Energy and Resources (BSEER), Laws, the Institute for Global Health, the Institute for Global Prosperity (IGP), the Department of Science, Technology, Engineering and Public Policy (STeAPP), the European Institute, the Warning Research Centre (WRC) and the cross-disciplinary Anthropocene initiative

- Expansion of the GGI's institutional network at UCL through the establishment of close ties with the newly launched Climate Politics Cluster (based at the UCL Department of Political Science) and the cross-faculty Health of the Public virtual school
- Expansion of the GGI's UCL-based expert network through the recruitment of new collaborators (Dr Danae Azaria, Dr Nick Hughes, Dr Jared Finnegan, Dr Fergus Green, Dr Inken von Borzyskowski)
- Continued engagement with the GGI's external networks, notably with individuals and institutions participating in the Horizon 2020 funded project on future scenarios in global governance (GLOBE), the Jean Monnet Network on EU/China Global Economic Governance, and the COP26 Universities Network



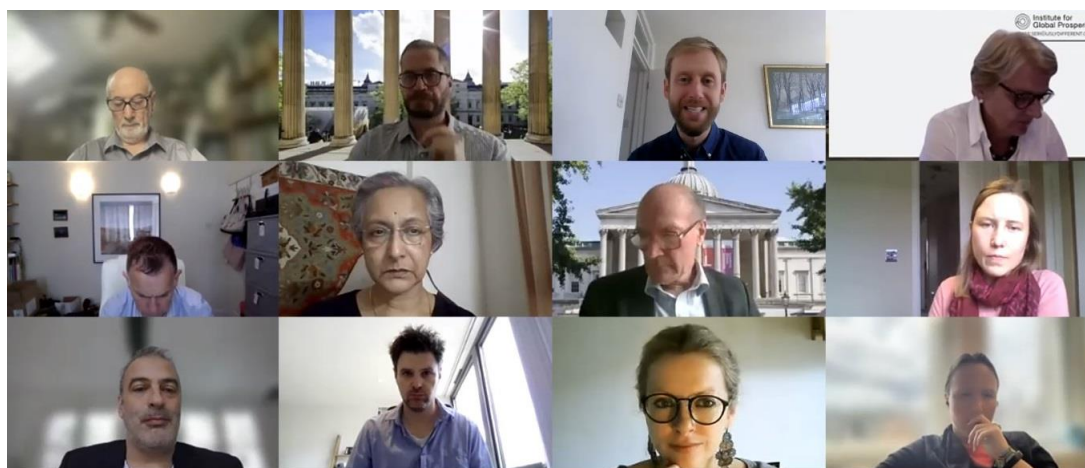

- Continued collaboration with the UCL Global Engagement Office (GEO) / Office of the Vice-Provost (International) and UCL Public Policy / Office of the Vice-Provost (Research) as well as UCL Grand Challenges
- Recruitment of a Research Assistant to assist with a major workshop and public event on youth engagement in global climate governance.

**Summary output:** As the GGI continues to foster cross-disciplinary research exchange and informed public debate, it can rely on a broad and diverse network of collaborators, partners and supporters at UCL and externally.

## Global Governance Research

- Ongoing research outputs and activities by the GGI directors, researchers and Thematic Directors (see Annex I for an overview of publications)
- GGI-led output under the Horizon 2020 funded GLOBE project has resulted in several journal publications this year, including in the *Journal of European Integration, Business Strategy and the Environment* and *Global Policy*, with other peer-reviewed publications planned
- Continued collaboration with individuals and institutions participating in the COP26 Universities Network has resulted in a publication in *Climate Policy*, which focuses on whole-system approaches to a socially just climate and energy transition
- Launched several new research agendas, in collaboration with colleagues from UCL and beyond, aimed at exploring the contours of a sustainable global economy, the role of participatory democracy processes in climate governance, and the future of global biodiversity governance
- Hosted a high-level research workshop, entitled 'A global economy that works for people and the planet,' which brought together leading researchers and policy experts on the debate between 'green growth' and 'degrowth'

- Supported and participated in a range of research workshops convened by partner institutions, including an international conference on 'EU-China experiences in climate change, energy and environmental taxation,' organised by the Jean Monnet Network, a climate change workshop / general assembly meeting hosted by the GLOBE network, and a research workshop hosted by the UCL Climate Politics Cluster

- Activities to support future thinkers in global governance research, including an interactive scenario exercise which brought together a cross-faculty group of students.

**Summary output:** The GGI continues to spearhead innovative global governance scholarship through its research, publications, workshops, education and networking activities. It remains committed to promoting cross-disciplinary and cross-thematic research on the most pressing global challenges of our time.

## Public Outreach and Public Policy Impact

- Staged 12 public events in total, with over 1,600 registered participants. Most events were held virtually, allowing speakers and participants from across the globe to join us (see map below). The events featured high-profile scholars, policy experts and public figures, such as former Irish President Mary Robinson or Professor Jeffrey Sachs, and highlighted important issues in global governance. For example, two GGI keynote events focused on global food governance, an issue that has gained increasing urgency in the wake of the Covid-19 pandemic, the Ukraine crisis, and the climate and biodiversity emergency

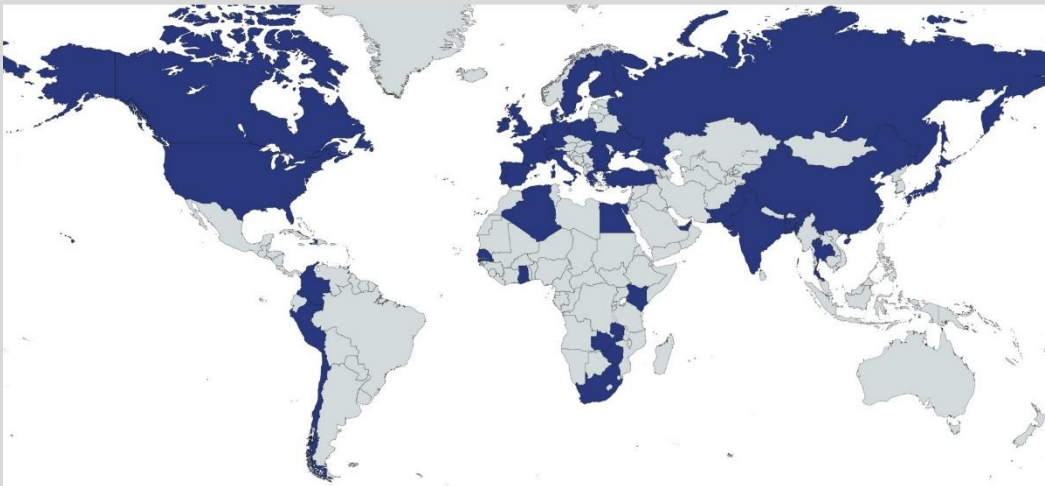
- Expanded the audience of the Institute's *Global Governance Futures* podcast, a platform for dialogue and reflection on the complex challenges facing humanity and possible global responses. In 2021-22, the podcast aired 15 episodes in total, featuring cutting-edge thinkers, such as Professor Amitav Acharya (American University), Dr Bayo Akomolafe (The Emergence Network), Professor Robyn Eckersley



(University of Melbourne), and Professor Jennifer Sterling-Folker (University of Connecticut), to name but a few. The podcast has received almost 7000 plays on SoundCloud in 2021-22 and has 832 individual subscribers on YouTube

- Publication of two policy-facing reports on the effectiveness and legitimacy of international organisations as part of the GGI's contributions to the Horizon 2020 funded GLOBE project
- Publication of several widely disseminated policy memos and briefs, focusing on issues such as post-pandemic recovery efforts, climate change loss and damage, and the role of young people in global climate governance
- Publication of blogs and commentaries on the GGI website and external channels (e.g. UCL Policy Lab, UK in a Changing Europe, or the GLOBE website)
- Dissemination of event invitations, news and publications via the GGI's mailing list (3,892 subscribers), Twitter (1,592 followers) and other channels

**Summary output:** In 2021-22, the GGI has engaged a large and international audience through its busy public events programme as well as a range of outward-facing and policy-focused reports, briefs and commentaries (see Annex I for a full list).

## Education and Student Engagement

- Students across UCL, including those enrolled in the MSc Global Governance and Ethics (GGE), have continued to provide invaluable support to the Institute's activities by writing commentaries and helping to organise and report on GGI events
- Hosted a student-led event on 'Climate Governance and Youth Engagement,' with support from UCL Grand Challenges and the UCL Environment Domain. Co-convened with UCL student Xuan Zi Han (Co-Lead of the COP26 Global Youth Statement), the event brought together youth climate leaders from across the world to share their personal experiences with trying to shape climate policymaking and global climate negotiations
- Hosted a scenario exercise on 'Imagining a Future Economic System', which brought together a cross-faculty group of students for an afternoon of creative thinking and interactive discussion on the possibility of radically different futures
- Hosted the first UCL Youth Global Governance Forum, in collaboration with the GGE student society. Supported by the Dean's Strategic Funds, the event introduced A-level students and UCL undergraduates to current debates in global governance

- Student-facing *Greta's Generation* podcast, hosted by GGI Research Fellow Kyle Herman, aimed at generating expert insight and advice for the future generation of climate leaders.

**Summary output:** The GGI remains committed to engaging future generations of global governance leaders by offering students unique insights into its research and policy-focused activities. This year, we have been excited to support several student-led activities aimed at the engagement of other young people on pressing global challenges and possible solutions.
