The 10th year of the renowned UCL Neuroscience Symposium highlighted the latest research in neuroscience at UCL and gave delegates the chance to create new cross-disciplinary links and foster collaboration between basic and clinical researchers.

The keynote was from Professor Li-Huei Tsai from the Picower Institute for Learning and Memory, MIT will deliver the keynote address with a talk on 'Network level approaches to studying Alzheimer's Disease'.

To mark the 10th anniversary of the event and to close the symposium, there was a panel discussion around the theme of 'The Future of Neuroscience', replacing the usual afternoon keynote.

The DD policy and associate process cover all research partnerships with organisations based in low and middle-income countries on the DAC list.
