Queers Read This!

Are you interested in discussing LGBT and queer themes in a friendly and informal setting? If so, come along to the next session of **UCL's Queer Space Reading Group**.



The group meets around twice a term, usually Tuesdays at 6pm. Participants discuss short pre-circulated texts or hear presentations on work-in-progress. Topics covered in recent sessions include queer representation and visibility; sexual racism; gender and the globalisation of sexualities; and LGBT identities and mobile technologies.

The Queer Space Reading Group is open to all students and staff at UCL. It is supported by \underline{qUCL} , the University's new LGBTQ research network. Readings and announcements are posted on the group's $\underline{Moodle\ Page}$ and anyone with a UCL login can join.

Sessions are usually led by one or two people who select the readings and kick start the discussion. The first session will take place on **27 October** and Peter Swaab (English Department) will be giving a presentation on Edward Lear's nonsense poetry and his sexuality.

Other provisional dates for the coming academic year are 1 December 2015 and 26 January, 8 March, 3 May and 7 June 2016. LGBTI Asylum Seekers and the UK

Asylum and forced migration are making the headlines in Europe, and long standing political and ethical questions are resurfacing in the public sphere. LGBTI people have been able to claim asylum on the grounds of their sexual orientation and/or gender identity since 1999 in the UK, and over the past fifteen years, their situation has been subject to many controversies and struggles between the Home Office and supporters of LGBTI asylum seekers. Their fair treatment in the asylum system has been and still is problematic; in 2009 the rate of refusal for LGBTI claimants was 98% at the first decision stage, against 73% for other types of asylum. (UKLGIG 2010) This statistic is not so damning once appeals are taken into account, but still highlights the great challenges that LGBTI people encounter when trying to find safety in the UK.

There has undoubtedly been gradual improvement, especially in the way cases are handled in recent years, with for example a favourable Supreme Court decision in 2010 (albeit with its limitations) putting an end to the Home Office's ability to send back asylum seekers in their countries of origin and asking them to be 'discreet' about their sexual orientation. Other advances can also be noted, including specific training for Home Office decision makers, and current debates on the issue of detention and the temporary suspension of the use of the detained fast-track system in 2015.

Now the challenge is to address a number of persistent issues: at the administrative level, the way credibility is assessed (based on both hetero- and homo-normative assumptions) harms the chances of asylum seekers to see their claims recognised. Likewise, the Home Office still shows a certain level of bad faith by focusing on minor inconsistencies to cast doubt on claimants' overall credibility. At a cultural and social level, LGBTI asylum seekers are still predominantly represented in the public sphere as powerless victims with little agency, preventing them from broadcasting their own voices in public arenas, and effectively obfuscating the many ways in which they actually express themselves, are part of communities and of the social fabric where they live.
