



What is the final accepted manuscript?

The open access policy for the next REF applies to articles and conference papers accepted after 1 April 2016. All researchers must upload their papers to UCL's Research Publications Service (RPS), **or they will not be eligible for the next REF**. Contact the Open Access Team (open-access@ucl.ac.uk) if you have any questions.

The REF policy specifically requires authors to upload their **final accepted manuscripts** to an open access **repository within three months of acceptance** (although an exception is permitted where they are uploaded within three months of first online publication). Uploaded manuscripts will be made publicly available through UCL's open access repository, UCL Discovery, usually after the publisher's embargo (delay on open access) period has passed, typically 6-24 months after publication. This is known as **Green Open Access** – a free option permitted by most subscription journals as standard. The final published PDF **cannot** usually be made open access in a repository unless a Gold open access fee has been paid. It is best practice to upload your manuscript to RPS as soon as it is accepted for publication. The version to upload is the final accepted manuscript, which may also be referred to as the "final author version", "final manuscript" or "post-print". It is the version which:

- **has** been **accepted** for publication
- **has** been **peer-reviewed**
- **has not** yet had the **publisher's layout** and **typesetting** applied

It can be a Word document or a PDF, and does not typically include pagination, a copyright statement, watermarks, or reviewers' comments and queries. Manuscripts

produced using a publisher's submission template can be uploaded, but proofs produced by publishers must not be uploaded. Some publishers can provide authors with the final accepted manuscript.

While the accepted manuscript contains all changes arising from peer-review, it does not usually include changes made during copy-editing and typesetting. If you would prefer to upload a version that contains these changes, you can either copy them in to the accepted manuscript, or ask the publisher for permission to make a subsequent version open access.

After you upload your paper to RPS, the Open Access Team will check the publisher's terms and conditions, and apply the relevant embargo period. The citation will appear in UCL Discovery, but the file itself will only be made open access after the embargo period.
