Careers & Progression Award

Rebecca Lindner & Cassandra Hugill In2Research Project Team

For their outstanding dedication and exceptional delivery of the pre-doctoral In2Research programme at UCL, securing £790,000 of funding to enhance access to postgraduate research for marginalised groups from low-income backgrounds. The programme involved the planning, organisation and delivery of workshops, professional development awaydays, mentoring, networking, and paid research experience placements at participating universities. The programme also requires that colleagues who mentor or supervise participants engage in cultural and race literacy training delivered by our partners, Leading Routes and UPSIGN, as a practical intervention to shift institutional cultures to be more inclusive and increase participants' sense of belonging.

Last year, 50 STEM participants (mostly UGs) completed the programme and we have just launched the OfS/REfunded project with over 90 participants, 33% of whom are studying/have studied at non-research-intensive universities. Together with Students' Union UCL, they will launch an In2research alumni programme this year to offer continued support and networking for participants.

Penny Longman UCL Careers Extra

For Penny's impactful commitment to running the Careers Extra programme for WP students over the years. Penny's ambition for and dedication to Careers Extra has pushed this move for UCL to fund Penny full time.
