#### What is RADAR?

RADAR is a research study investigating the effects of reducing antipsychotic medication. Half of the people who take part are supported to reduce their antipsychotic medication and the other half stay on their current dose. We meet all of

#### How are you involved in RADAR?

"LEAP involvement helps RADAR to co-produce more effectively and to ensure that the voice of the service user/carer is heard. In such an important study it is crucial that people with lived experience are able to make a meaningful contribution"

#### Why do you think RADAR is important for patients, and for carers like yourself?

"In my experience, the adverse side effects of antipsychotic medications have such a drastic impact on the lives of patients and their families; quality of life is very much diminished. The RADAR study will offer a major step forward in our understanding of treatment for psychosis."

benefits of the medication. Previous research suggested that in people who have had just one episode of psychosis, reducing antipsychotic medication can help to improve quality of life for some people. RADAR is investigating whether the same is true in those with more long-term psychosis.



\*LEAP is made up of people with expertise in antipsychotic medication through personal use or as a carer for someone with psychosis. It meets regularly to discuss the progress of the study and topics such as future recruitment and study findings.

#### What have we been doing?

Since our last newsletter we have continued to recruit participants across the country and we now have 140 people taking part. We've been following up our participants at 6 and 12 months and we will soon follow up with our first participants at 24 months. We have started to analyse the data from our interview study, where participants gave their views about taking antipsychotic medication. We are using content analysis to find the most common reasons why people want to stop or continue their medication.
