Extenuating Circumstances

If your assessment is disrupted by illness, bereavement or other personal difficulties, you may be eligible for 'Extenuating Circumstances'. This is a formal process to let your department know about a situation which might affect your performance in an exam.

Plagiarism, one form of <u>academic dishonesty</u>, is the representation of other people's work or ideas as your own without appropriate referencing or acknowledgement.

Plagiarism includes the use of Generative Artificial Intelligence (GenAI) tools that exceeds that permitted in the assessment brief. Find <u>guidance on engaging with GenAI in assessments</u>. You're at risk of plagiarism if you:

- copy something from a book, journal or website without proper use of quotation marks and referencing.
- paraphrase or switch key words in a text with synonyms without acknowledging the original source;
- incorrectly identify quotations; or
- don't include a complete bibliography of the sources you've used in your work.

UCL uses **Turnitin, a plagiarism detection tool** to check your work against a large database of sources such as journal articles, websites and other students' work. It provides a 'similarity index score' expressed as a percentage, which is a guide for how much of the text you've submitted matches other sources.

Before you submit your assessment, you can check your work using <u>Turnitin Similarity Checker</u>. To avoid plagiarism, make sure you understand how to correctly acknowledge and reference other people's work.

Find out how to reference correctly



The <u>Exams and Assessment Hub</u> contains all regulations, guidance and support resources you need to prepare for your centrally managed assessments.

Find <u>guidance on how to access support or help during or on</u> <u>the day of your assessment</u>. Do not contact your department or tutors to report issues on the day. They will not be able to resolve them.
